- 4. Who pays Cates's bail? Why? What is bail?

- 5. So who "wins" the case? In what sense did Cates win? In what sense did he lose? In what sense did Brady win, and in what sense did he lose? Explain.
- 6. How do the townspeople react to the verdict?
- 7. Explain Hornbeck's message in his "Also-Ran" speech on page 121-2.
- 8. What is the message that Rachel conveys in her two speeches on page 124? How has Rachel changed? How do Rachel's comments about ideas show that she has read Darwin's book?
- 9. How do you interpret Drummond's final action with respect to the two books as the play closes?
